

# What are Lexia Lessons?

Lexia Lessons are explicit lesson plans to guide teachers in providing face-to-face, targeted intervention to individual students, small groups, or the whole class. Each Lexia Lesson includes:

- A description of the skill and its importance to language and literacy development
- Bulleted, concise prompts for educators to provide context and model skills
- Anchor Charts to highlight the key points related to a specific skill with visually engaging illustrations and graphic organizers that support on-the-spot instruction
- Answer Keys to offer educators an easy reference to assess student learning
- Student-centered Practice sections build in complexity and closely follow the instructional language, skill, and vocabulary students learned in the online program
- Lexia Lesson slide decks are available on the *Resources Hub* > *Support for Instruction* page.

Lexia Lessons are available across all program levels and are automatically recommended for struggling students, based on performance in the online program.

## Why are Lexia Lessons important?

PowerUp provides teachers with actionable data, and Lexia Lessons are an important part of that action plan. The embedded practice and instruction in the online program may be sufficient for some students, but many students may require additional targeted, face-to-face instruction to be successful. Educators are integral to the delivery of each lesson—they control the dialogue and pace. This personalized approach supports the varying needs of all students. Lesson delivery recommendations—how many lessons? which lessons?—vary depending on data in the myLexia educator platform that indicates student progress and performance.

Lexia Lessons include activities that reinforce and extend online learning, as well as opportunities for oral expression and writing. While the time to deliver each Lexia Lesson varies, most practice activities can be done in less than twenty minutes.

## How can Lexia Lessons be used?

Different teachers will most likely have different levels of familiarity with each skill area. Some teachers may want to closely follow the provided prompts and directives, while others may feel comfortable referring directly to the Anchor Chart and reproducible pages for students.
